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GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

ALL EXHIBITS – ALL DEPARTMENTS – ALL DIVISIONS

All Fair Premiums Will Be Mailed

1. The Jefferson County Fair Association reserves the right to cancel or modify with or without notice, any or all of the provisions, premiums or purses specified in this premium book without recourse, if required to do so by strikes, war, weather or other conditions beyond our control.
2. All entries must be made in the name of a bona fide owner of the animal or article. All exhibitors of articles entered for premiums must deliver the same to their proper department. Only one entry per class allowed per exhibitor, except in livestock. No premiums will be paid if exhibit is removed before release time. Premiums will be held until the exhibitor cleans the exhibit space.
3. All Livestock must be preregistered and are to be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m., Saturday, August 15 and will be released between 1:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m., Sunday, August 23.
4. All Rabbits & Poultry are to be preregistered and entered between 10:00 am and 3:00 p.m., Saturday, August 15 and will be released between 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. on Sunday, August 23.
5. All other exhibits are to be entered between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Saturday, August 15 and remain until Saturday, August 22, 9:30 p.m.
6. All protests must be made in writing and filed with the Fair Board Secretary or Manager on or before the last day of the Fair at the Fair office.
7. No Judge is permitted to change an award after it has been awarded.
8. It will be the decision of the judges whether an entry receives a placing.
9. The Board of Directors of the Jefferson County Fair Association will exercise all possible precautions against outbreak of fire, theft or accidents. However, they will not assume any responsibility for loss to person or property.
10. Special awards are awarded by Sponsor, not by Fair Association, unless otherwise listed.
11. A tie for the most blue ribbons award will be broken as follows: Most Blue Ribbons; Most Red Ribbons; Most White Ribbons; Most Exhibits. If a tie cannot be broken, names will be placed in a hat, and one name will be drawn.
12. Any attempt or action to influence, intimidate or threaten any officer, employee, judge or other fair official will not be tolerated and should be reported to the fair officials immediately. Exhibitors, parents of exhibitors, patrons or others who commit such actions will be disqualified from competition and/or future competition, will forfeit any earned premiums or other awards, and may be asked to remove all exhibits from the Fair.
13. Drop or extension cords, if necessary, must be 14-2 or larger and U.L. rated for outdoor use
14. The Fair welcomes ADA Service Animals. The fair does not allow Therapy, Emotional Support animals and all other pets on the fairgrounds.

Jefferson County Fair Political Non-Participation Policy:

The Jefferson County Fair Association, Inc., was organized "To promote, sponsor, and direct a County Fair, and to do any and all things necessary for the promotion, sponsorship and direction of said Fair, including the awarding of prizes for exhibits to be shown at said Fair, the charging of admission rates, the exhibition of agricultural and horticultural products and any and all things generally and commonly done in connection with the putting on of a county fair."

JCFA does not participate or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of (or in opposition to) any candidate for public office. 3. Bring your entry on Saturday, August 15, 2026, between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.
 - Static entries must arrive at the fairgrounds between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.
 - Livestock and rabbit entries must be preregistered on or before midnight on July 22, 2026, at www.jeffersoncountyfairwv.org
 - Poultry entries must be preregistered using the forms provided in the fair catalog and prior to the date listed on the respective form.
4. Exhibitor numbers will be emailed (if an email address is on file). Be sure to bring your exhibitor number to check in your exhibits.

1. ENTRIES: Upon receipt of your entry, you will be emailed a confirmation and given a number. If you do not receive confirmation with your assigned number by August 14th, please contact us using the information on this page.
2. NUMBERS: We will start with one (1) and continue numerically until the last entry. If your club members have a scheduling conflict (FAIR ACTIVITIES ONLY*) we will do our best to accommodate.
3. CHECK-IN: We will start checking in items @ 5:45 p. m. (as long as the show ring is available). You will need to know your number upon checking in. Please be patient, we have a system, and it works.
4. RESALE OF ANY ITEM WILL NOT BE PERMITTED: Each 4-H, FFA Chapter and FCCLA organization in Jefferson County is permitted to sell their item ONCE in this auction. (EXCEPTION – Any Club who is attending a National Event can have a separate entry for expenses used solely for the National Event.) We apologize, but in fairness to everyone involved in the auction, we cannot resale any item during the night.
5. BAKED ITEMS: Includes cake, pie, bread, rolls, cookies or candy, but MUST BE CONTAINED AS ONE ITEM. Maximum size of contained item not to exceed 20"x 20".
6. REJECTED ITEMS: We cannot accept any refrigerated items (due to health department requirements). If you bring an item that requires refrigeration, you will be turned away. **If your entry is not all contained as one item, you will be turned away.**
7. DISPLAY: All items are to be attractively displayed on or in a non-returnable plate or container. The item must be covered and able to be seen. Please keep in mind when planning your item, that members need to be able to carry it safely around the ring.
8. INGREDIENT LABEL: An ingredient label must be attached to each baked item along with the name of the organization. Items must be baked by members of your club, chapter or organization.
9. PRESENTATION: There must be at least 2 members to present your item. One member introduces your club, chapter or organization and give a brief summary of what you are offering for sale, who is present from your club, chapter or organization, and how you plan to use the proceeds from the sale. PLEASE BE BRIEF!! And the others walk around and present your item.
10. BUYERS: All proceeds will go to the 4-H, FFA Chapter, and FCCLA Organization for their community projects. Buyers will make checks payable to: Jefferson County Fair Association. Payment is required at the end of the auction. Checks will be mailed to the clubs, chapters and organizations as soon as possible after all fair accounts are settled. PROSPECTIVE BUYERS: Don't forget to get out and invite your buyers to the auction.

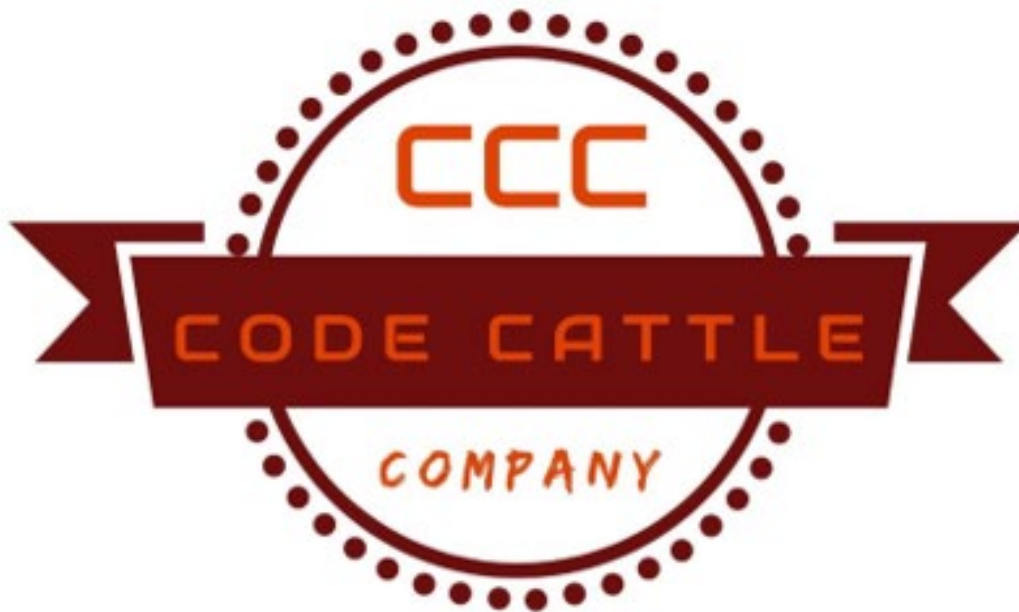

HORSE PULLING CONTEST

Thursday, August 20, 2026, 6:30 p.m.

Stage – Dennis Barron (304) 876-6686, 1329 Shepherd Grade Rd., Shepherdstown, WV 25443.

CLASSES:

- Under 3,600 lbs.
- Over 3,600 lbs.
- Note – Weighing is optional; however, the judge has the right to ask Teams to cross the scales.

RULES FOR HORSE PULLING:

1. The pulling area shall be 20 feet wide. Violation of 20-foot width occurs when the horses or sled touch the line markers.
2. Pulls shall consist of 27 1/2 ft., but a shorter distance will be used to determine the winner or placement at the end of the contest.
3. No more than four people are allowed with each team.
4. Three succeeding trials shall be allowed at each weight.
5. Three succeeding unsuccessful attempts to hook to sled will count as a pull
6. Do not touch horses after they are hooked to sled.
7. Any command by the driver to go will be counted as a pull and measurement will be recorded, except in case of breakage, which entitles team to another pull.
8. In case of breakage a team may leave sled, but must remain in the pulling area until repaired, and come in at of round for its turn unless repair is done in three minutes. Teams will pick up proper place in the next round.
9. Each team shall be driven by one driver in the entire contest, except in case of injury.
10. All teams must take the first pull but may forfeit the second pull. The third pull must be taken after all other teams have their first and second pulls.
11. First and second pull shall be in the direction indicated by the judges. Third pull may be taken in either direction providing enough room remains within the end boundaries.
12. Drivers and helpers shall not prod, whip, or touch horses while pulling and must drive with reasonably tight lines, and in no case will a driver be allowed to whirl or shake lines over horses.
13. All drivers must ride if a seat is provided.
14. There shall be at least 3 judges for each contest, and a majority shall determine decisions.
15. Abusive treatment of horses on or off pulling field or fairground, before, during, or after contest, or profanity can disqualify contestants if judges see fit.
16. No alcoholic beverages allowed on the fairgrounds.
17. Weight for the start of the pull shall be determined by officials so as to hold down the number of pulls and still give the spectators a good show.
18. All lightweight horses will be permitted to pull in heavy class, except in case of not enough teams to make a good pull and with the consent of the judges or fair officials.
19. Drivers will draw for places to pull before the contest starts.
20. Drivers must be ready when their turn comes. Willful waiting is not tolerated.
21. Bridles may be open-faced or blinds that are up in that place. Any driver that drops blinds during the contest will be disqualified for that pull.
22. In case of tie for longest distance, drivers are required to pull it off.
23. If you have the longest distance on any load, you don't have to pull or give up any turns until you are beaten in distance.
24. Any horses that act unruly can be sent from the pulling area by the judges and be checked by a vet.
25. All horses are subject to WV Department of Agriculture Health Regulations printed in this catalog under Department A-Livestock.

RULES AND REGULATIONS:

Due to ever changing health and environmental factors in the agriculture community and the need to protect exhibitors, livestock, and the public, at times it will be necessary alter or deviate from the written rules and policies of the Fair. Therefore, with the consent of Fair officials and in the interest of public safety, official announcements made during or prior to the Fair will take precedent over pre-printed rules and other like materials.

1. All youth (4-H & FFA) and open class entries in the Livestock Department must register all animals to be brought to the fair using the Jefferson County Fair's online registration. Registration can be found at www.jeffersoncountyfairwv.org. All youth (4-H & FFA) entries must also submit a code of practice form that has to be completely filled during project entry. The online livestock registration must be completed by July 22, 2026. Only preregistered animals will be allotted barn space. No Exceptions!
2. All livestock must be on the fairgrounds and be in place by 3:30 p.m., Saturday, August 15, 2026. No exceptions. Release of all livestock will be Sunday, August 23, 2026, 1:00 – 9:00 a.m. Livestock exhibitor group clean-up will be held on Sunday, August 23, 2026, 9:00 – 11:00 a.m.
3. The livestock committee reserves the right to have neglected animals and animals that are not shown removed from the Fairgrounds.
4. The competition is open to Jefferson County Residents and 4-H and FFA members meeting requirements of their respective organization.
5. All open class breeding animals in dairy cattle and goat divisions must be registered. Sheep and swine must be of good type. Open and youth beef exhibitors may enter purebred or commercial animals. To qualify as a Youth Exhibitor, the exhibitor must be active in a Jefferson County 4-H club or an active FFA member of a Jefferson County Chapter. All 4-H and FFA animals must be current project animals according to official 4-H or FFA records. All 4-H and FFA animals must be shown by a 4-H or FFA exhibitors in Jefferson County.
6. Livestock entries will be limited to a total of eight (8) animals excluding rabbits and poultry. The livestock department reserves the right to further limit entries because of space limitations.
7. Youth exhibitors may exhibit their respective entries in a qualifying open class for the same animal if there is open competition in that class.
8. No exhibitor may enter more than two (2) animals per class.
9. An animal may only be shown in one division.
10. Livestock exhibitors must furnish and attend to their own feed and bedding.
11. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care and behavior of their own animals while at the Fair. Exhibitors are encouraged to have liability insurance. Each Division superintendent is responsible for having unmanageable animals removed from the show ring.
12. All animals exhibited must comply with health regulations of the West Virginia Department of Agriculture.
13. Youth exhibitors are expected to care for, fit, and groom their own animals.
14. Horse/ponies are required to stay in the horse barn or arenas at all times, may only be exercised in the arenas, and must have a halter on while doing so. No one rides a horse on the fairgrounds except the owner of such animal. Horses and ponies are to be in their respective stalls by 9:00 p.m.; the barn closes at 11:00 p.m. The horse wash area may only be used by horse exhibitors.
15. Each youth and adult exhibitor of dairy cattle, goats, sheep, swine, beef cattle and horses will receive one weekly admission pass at no charge. Each 4-H and FFA livestock family will receive one additional weekly pass.
16. To aid exhibitors in complying with the Federal Food and Drug Administration residue avoidance program, the Jefferson County Fair has prepared the following list of tips and guidelines:
 - A. Become knowledgeable of FDA/USDA rules and regulations.
 - B. Use only FDA approved drugs, chemicals and feed additives.
 - C. Read the label carefully. Labeling directions change frequently
 - D. Follow label instructions exactly.
 - E. Observe pre-slaughter withdrawal times precisely.
 - F. Don't assume that any drug or medication is approved. Be sure it is labeled for use in food producing animals.
 - G. Seek the advice of your local veterinarian, county extension agent and/or agriculture science teacher.
 - H. Inform your veterinarian about your animal's specific withdrawal requirements. (Inform any veterinarian treating your animal that it is a market show animal and that it must not be within any withdrawal times at date of show and sale.
 - I. Use caution in feeding medicated feed.
 - J. Do not use any type of tranquilizer.
 - K. Evaluate every substance that goes into your animal.
 - L. Keep accurate records of treatment and medication.
 - M. Don't substitute medication for sound management.
 - N. Obey the law, obey the rules.

17. Jefferson County Fair reserves the right to drug test any animal at the discretion of the Livestock Committee.
18. No running or bicycles will be allowed in the barn area.
19. Exhibitors are to keep stalls, aisles, and tie areas between barns clean. Trimming Chutes are permitted between barns only. No tie-out areas allowed.
20. No youth exhibitors will be permitted to stay overnight on the fairgrounds.
21. No generators will be permitted in the livestock barn area.
22. The use of mechanical and/or electrical appliances such as fans, lights, dryers, gates, etc., that may be considered dangerous or a nuisance in the barns will be monitored and controlled by the respective Division Superintendent.
23. Any attempt to influence or intimidate a judge before or after a show or any attempt to obtain a premium by misrepresentation shall be reported at once to the Superintendent of Livestock who shall order that such an exhibitor be excluded from competition at this exhibition and any premium that may have been awarded shall be forfeited.
24. To maintain a high degree of confidence in the livestock shows, the Jefferson County Fair reserves the right to disqualify any animals that have been fitted in an unethical manner or animals for which an exhibitor gives false information.
25. Exhibitors may post "Do Not Touch" signs near their animals.
26. No one is to have needles, syringes and injectable medications in their possession on the fairgrounds, unless they have written orders from a licensed veterinarian for their use.
27. A 4-H or FFA youth exhibitor must be a current member of either a WV 4-H Club or FFA Chapter and must be enrolled in either program by March 1 of the current year.
28. No alcoholic beverages are permitted on the fairgrounds. All barns are to be closed and vacated at midnight.
29. Livestock must be inspected by the Fair's official entry inspection team prior to entry on the fairgrounds on Saturday, August 15, 2026, and may not enter the fairgrounds any earlier. Livestock will not officially be entered for exhibition until after 9:00 a.m.
30. No tarps or other obstacles will be hung by exhibitors in the barns to obstruct the view through the barns, except in the case of bad weather.
31. Youth Exhibitor Code of Practice Forms must be fully completed and submitted prior to being considered officially entered for exhibition on August 15, 2026
32. Official Fair ear tags are not to be removed from Market animals to be considered valid, unless the 4-H or FFA member contacts and receives instructions to do so from the Superintendent of Fair Livestock. If a tag is lost, it must be reported to and re-tagged by a fair official before fair week. Any animal originally tagged as a market animal that is not being shown as a market animal must have the market tag removed prior to exhibition.
33. The Fair Livestock Code of Practice will be enforced, and violators will be sent home from the Fair along with the forfeit of all premium money.
34. All 4-H and FFA members with an animal project will be required to enter their respective fitting and showing contest or forfeit all premium money. Exceptions for disabilities will be granted.
35. A 4-H or FFA exhibitor cannot sell any market sale item through the Jefferson County Fair if they have sold any item through a 4-H or FFA Livestock Auction in a neighboring county fair's sale during the same calendar year.
36. Nose rings are not permitted in Market Steers.
37. Exhibitor canopies/tents between the barns may not exceed 10'x10' and should not exceed any physical location markings made by fair officials. Canopies, picnic tables, and alike should not be placed at the ends of the livestock barns without express permission of fair officials.
38. Youth livestock exhibitors must be present to sell their animals. Should a schedule conflict arise, the youth livestock exhibitor is required to submit a handwritten request to waive the policy and provide an explanation of their schedule conflict. This statement MUST be in the hands of the Livestock Superintendent TWO WEEKS prior to the beginning of the Jefferson County Fair. A committee comprised of the Livestock Superintendent, Livestock Sale Chairman and the Species Department Superintendent shall meet to consider the request and relay their decision to the exhibitor prior to the beginning of the Fair. Each request will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Should any conflict of interest exist between the exhibitor and members of the committee, such committee member shall excuse themselves and another committee member shall be appointed by the Fair President.
39. All youth livestock projects will be subject to all rules and regulations of their respective organization and will be verified with the 4-H agent or the FFA Advisor respectively. These includes but is not limited to record keeping, quality assurance training, and showmanship guidelines. Failure to comply could result in the exhibitor's disqualification.
40. No grills, smokers, or other kitchen appliances (i.e. refrigerators, microwaves, etc.) are allowed in the barn area. Crackpots are acceptable as long as they are connected safely and monitored.
41. Drop or extension cords, if necessary, must be 14-2 or larger and U.L. rated for outdoor use. Cords should be installed above the bedding in the livestock barns.
42. 4-H & FFA market animal projects must be owned by the exhibitor by weigh-in for the respective market animal species. All other 4-H or FFA project animals must be owned by June 1 of the respective fair year. Any project animal that is owned in partnership must have appropriate ownership paperwork recognizing joint ownership and must be presented upon request of fair officials.
43. Market animals requiring castration must be recovered and visibly healed prior to exhibition.
44. Body Scoring will be used to ensure animal exhibits meet the JC Fair Livestock Committee Standard
 - a. Beef Cattle – 4 and above
 - b. Chicken – 2 and above
 - c. Dairy Cattle – 2 and above
 - d. Goats – 2 and above
 - e. Horses – 4 and above
 - f. Rabbit – 4 and above
 - g. Sheep – 2 and above
 - h. Swine – 3 and above

JEFFERSON COUNTY FAIR 4-H AND FFA LIVESTOCK CODE OF PRACTICE

(Adopted by Jefferson County Fair Association, 1996; Revised 2004)

To maintain a high degree of confidence in the livestock show, the Jefferson County Fair reserves the right to disqualify any animals that have been fitted in an unethical manner. Unethical fitting shall include any injection of gas, solid, liquid under the skin or any man-made article attached to the body to alter the normal conformation. It shall also include any cutting or tearing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal. It shall also include attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development as well as the dyeing or coloring of individuals which alters their natural coloration. Any attempts to change the degree of firmness of any individual shall be considered unethical.

I believe that my participation in the 4-H and FFA Livestock Program should demonstrate my own ability, knowledge, and skill as a feeder and fitter of livestock. I will do my own work and only accept advice and support from others.

I will not use abusive and questionable techniques in feeding, fitting and showing of my animals. I will not resort to fraudulent, illegal, or deceptive practices when fitting them for show. I also will not allow my parents, my supervisor, or any other adult to employ such practices to my animal. This includes those unethical practices stated above.

I will read and understand the rules of all livestock shows in which I am a participant. I ask that my parents and the supervisor of my project animal not break the rules or make exception on my behalf. I wish for my livestock project to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer (good and bad) and how to live with the outcome.

I realize that I am responsible for:

- turning in my project circular and record guide on all entered animals at the fair
- the proper care and treatment of my animals
- the productions of wholesome food, and
- the development of sound moral character in myself-and others
- following the 4-H or FFA expectations and requirements in relation to my 4-H or FFA membership.

I/We hereby agree to abide by and enforce the 4-H and FFA Livestock Code of Practice.

I/We have read and agree to abide by and enforce the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics.

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NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITION (IAFE)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock events shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE" National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibitions in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon the request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in events, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medications, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with burden of the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show premises, all treatment involving the use of drugs, and/ or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedures or injection of any foreign substances or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individuals to disciplinary action.
9. This application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitors, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notice to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorized with jurisdiction over such infractions.

4-H & FFA FITTING AND SHOWING RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR ALL CLASSES OF FITTING & SHOWING

- Classes are only open to Jefferson County 4-H and FFA members with bona fide project animals owned or leased by the members (see general livestock rules and regulations for further clarification).
- All 4-H and FFA members with an animal project will be required to enter their respective fitting and showing contest or forfeit all premium money. Exceptions for disabilities will be granted.
- Each exhibitor must use their own project animal except as requested by the judge.

Judging Criteria:

FITTING OF ANIMAL

- A. Body Condition: Includes quality of the hide and general condition of animal over-conditioned and under-conditioned animals should receive slight to serious discrimination.
- B. Grooming: Includes cleanliness of animals; proper clipping; well-trimmed feet and a healthy coat of hair. Improperly groomed animals should receive slight to serious discrimination.

PERFORMANCE IN THE SHOW RING

- A. Performance of Animals: Animals should start, lead, stop and pose in satisfactory manner.
- B. Presentation of Animals: A good showman minimizes minor faults of an animal.
- C. Ability to show animals other than own: Good showmen are at ease when handling any properly trained animal.
- D. Alertness of Showmen: Doing the right thing at the right time is important. (Follow instructions of the judge.)
- E. Sportsmanship of the Showman
- F. Proper 4-H or FFA attire.

CLASSES

- A. Four Contests will be held
 - i. Novice – Any exhibitor 13 or younger as of January 1 of the fair year showing a 4-H or FFA animal project for the first time.
 - ii. Junior Exhibitors 13 – and-younger as of January 1 of the fair year
 - iii. Senior Exhibitors 14 – and-up as of January 1 of the fair year
 - iv. Previous Winners (past and present winners)
- B. There will be special awards for excellence in 4-H and FFA fitting and showing
- C. The Fiber fitting and showing contest has an additional purpose to test the knowledge of the participant on wool quality. Participants will be asked questions to test their knowledge of shepherding and issues related to the production of hand-spinning quality fiber.
 - i. Fiber animals should be free of dirt, chaff, bedding, dung locks and burs.

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FFA PROJECT ANIMAL EXHIBITOR REQUIREMENTS

If you are showing animals in the Jefferson County Fair through your FFA Chapter, you are bound to the following expectations and requirements in relation to your FFA Membership and Supervised Agriculture Experience (SAE) Records.

All FFA Exhibitors must:

- Be enrolled in at least one agriculture education course during the school year
- Pay all current Local, State, and National FFA Dues and achieve active membership in your chapter.
- Have attended the mandatory FFA exhibitor meeting held in the fall.
- Records must be recorded in the AET platform
- Complete records must be recorded up to and including August 9th of the fair year.
- In order to be considered complete, records must include the following information ...
 - Purchase price, date and vendor of the project animal(s)
 - Purchase prices, dates and vendors for all feed and medical attention related to the project animal(s)
 - Purchase prices, dates and vendors for any capital items utilized for the production and exhibition of project animals.
 - SAE Plans, which outline where the animal has been raised, the responsibilities and expectations of the producer/exhibitor as well as learning outcomes•
 - Youth Quality Assurance Training Certificate of Completion Number
 - Weekly journal entries spanning from purchase date until August 9
- Livestock Code of Practice Forms (included in fair catalog) must be signed by your FFA Advisor and submitted to the fair officials by 3:00 PM during fair check-in.

Any exhibitor that fails to submit complete SAE records in the approved format, is subject to disqualification from Jefferson County Fair as a youth livestock exhibitor and a participant in the youth livestock sale.

FFA animal exhibitors must follow Official Dress Guidelines:

Exhibitors of FFA project animals must be outfitted in Official FFA Dress for the showing and selling as outlined by the National FFA Organization, unless respective species requires different attire. i.e. dairy and horses.

Official FFA Dress Includes:

- Black Pants
- White colored shirt/blouse
- Blue/black tie or scarf
- Black socks
- Black or Brown shoes/boots
- Official FFA Jacket zipped to the top

FFA members presenting in showmanship and judging classes are required to wear official dress and when visiting and speaking with potential buyers. If a student is in need of any component of official dress contact your advisor by August 1st. Failure to wear FFA Official Dress will result in disqualification from showing or selling animals.

Students will be excused from school on show days only.

These provisions are strongly encouraged by but not enforced by the Jefferson County Fair Association, Inc. Enforcement of and reporting projects eligible for competition is done by the respective FFA or 4-H representatives. All FFA exhibitors must follow the registration deadlines set by the Jefferson County Fair.

4-H LIVESTOCK PROJECT EXHIBITOR GUIDELINES

Youth wanting to exhibit an animal(s) at the Jefferson County Fair, West Virginia State Fair, State Dairy Show, or any other State 4-H activity, must be enrolled as a Jefferson County 4-H member in good standing, with the Jefferson County Extension Office and enrolled in the appropriate species 4-H project.

1. In order to exhibit their animal at the Jefferson County Fair, all youth taking animal projects must complete the following and turn into their club leader in late June/early July (Please note, club leaders are required to turn in all of their members' project books, record guides, and activity records as required)
 - Completed 4-H Animal Project Book
 - WVU 4-H Animal Record Guide (breeding only)
 - 4-H Member Activity Record
 - All 4-H/FFA youth who enroll in a live- stock (beef, dairy, swine, goat, poultry, rabbit, sheep) project must complete a Youth Quality Assurance Training no later than July 1, 2026.
2. Market exhibitors will turn in their record guides during picture pickup, which occurs on a Saturday following the fair.
 - Youth will receive premium money and be eligible for awards based on their project book and exhibit scores. Graded market record guides will be returned when youth pick up their check, or to the club leader.
 - Youth that do not turn in a record guide or complete the financial portion of the guide as required will not be permitted to exhibit at the 2027 fair as a 4-H exhibitor. 4-H livestock projects are meant to teach members about animal husbandry and finances. The most important part is the financial page that tells the member if they've made or lost money on the project.
3. Each animal that is exhibited at the Fair as a 4-H project MUST be recorded in an animal record guide.
4. 4-H animal exhibitors are required to participate in their species showmanship class for each species exhibited at the Fair.
5. 4-H animal exhibitors must comply with the 4-H Showmanship Dress Code.
6. Each youth exhibitor must handle their own animal in the ring, except under special circumstances approved by the department superintendent and/or Fair Board.
7. All animals must be trained for handling and showmanship. Unruly behavior of the animal will result in immediate disqualification.
8. Inhumane treatment will result in disqualification from the show.
9. 4-H members are expected to do their own grooming, fitting and feeding with a minimum of assistance from parents, leaders and/or other members. If a small amount of assistance is required, the 4-H member must be present and actively participating.
10. Each exhibitor must take care of their own animal(s). 4-H members must furnish their own feed, bedding and showing equipment.
11. Each exhibitor is responsible for the area around his or her own animal during the fair, as well as clean up after the fair.
12. All animals must be in their appropriate areas at all times.
13. There will be a collective community clean up on Sunday morning after the Fair. Each exhibitor is expected to participate.
14. Goats and lambs must have Scrapie tags in order to be weighed in. Beef cattle will need to have a premise ID tag.
15. Youth exhibitors must have proof of ownership of animals and ensure that animals have all the required identification tags etc.
16. Failure to comply with all Jefferson County 4-H and/or Jefferson County Fair Youth Agriculture policies could result in the disqualification of the 4-H project.

4-H DRESS CODE FOR SHOWING & SELLING

4-H animal exhibitors must follow 4-H professional dress guidelines as established and enforced by the West Virginia University Extension Service Jefferson County 4-H Program when presenting in showmanship and judging classes. 4-H members are strongly encouraged to present themselves in a professional manner and be a positive representation of the 4-H Emblem when visiting and speaking with potential buyers as well as during the youth livestock sale.

4-H SHOWMANSHIP DRESS CODE:

- Clean colored sleeved shirts/blouses with collars.
- Dark trousers (dark jeans with no holes will be acceptable) preferably worn with a belt.
- Closed-toed, sturdy shoes (leather boots preferred).
- A green or black tie or a green scarf can be worn but are not required.
- No hats, tank tops, T-shirts, midriffs showing, or shorts.
- Horse and Dairy Showmanship and animal classes have their own dress code.

GUIDELINES FOR ADULTS ASSISTING YOUTH WITH 4-H ANIMAL PROJECTS

- Know and follow all the rules.
- Model good character and livestock ethics.
- Allow youth to do their project books and record guides themselves. It is ok to provide some assistance, but it is NOT ok to do the work for them.
- Be supportive and involved.
- Remember that it is about the process not necessarily the product.
- Provide proper equipment.
- Refrain from being a show ring sideline director.
- Do not disparage the competition.
- Refrain from complaining about officials (Fair/4-H)
- Honor your child.

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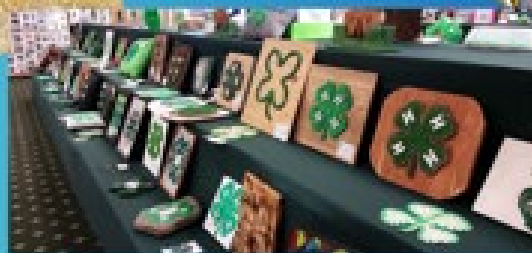
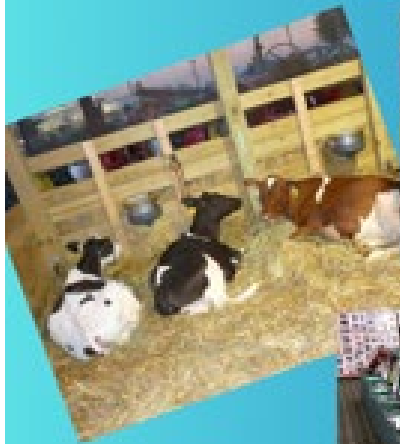
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OFFICIAL ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS 2026

West Virginia Department of Agriculture Charleston, West Virginia
West Virginia Fairs, Festivals, and Purebred Consignment Sales

This is an official interpretation of regulations promulgated under the authority of Chapter 19, Article 9 of the State Code of West Virginia. This applies to fairs, festivals and shows.

All livestock imported into the State of West Virginia for fairs, festivals, and shows shall be accompanied by an Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection approved by the livestock health official of the State of origin. A copy of the approved Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall be forwarded to the Director of the Animal Health Division, West Virginia Department of Agriculture, Capitol Building, Charleston, West Virginia 25305, and should be in his possession (5) five days prior to the arrival of livestock.

Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspections (CVI) is good for 30 days. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.
Any animal showing signs of a potential infectious or contagious disease will not be allowed to participate in the event.

Note: Cattle and goats from other states with disease outbreaks may be required to secure a special permit from the Director of Animal Health Division, West Virginia Department of Agriculture, Charleston, West Virginia 25305, phone number (304) 558- 2214, before being admitted into West Virginia.

If the animal is to be sold other than for slaughter, purebred consignment rules apply.

ALL LIVESTOCK MUST MEET THE STATE OF DESTINATION HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AS TO MOVEMENT OF ANIMALS. SOME VARIATION IS FOUND IN HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AMONG THE SEVERAL STATES.

The final disposition of all entries shall be made by a WVDA Animal Health Inspector or in their absence, a local fair official.

Official ID is a requirement for interstate movement for cattle.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR CATTLE

All out-of-state cattle must be accompanied by an Official CVI with Official Identification listed. Health certificates are good for 30 days.

TUBERCULOSIS IN CATTLE

Cattle to be exhibited at West Virginia fairs, festivals, and shows must meet one of the following requirements:

From West Virginia: No test required, if herd is not under quarantine for tuberculosis
From Other States: (1) From Bovine Tuberculosis Free State - No test required. Inter-state CVI is required. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.

From other than Bovine Tuberculosis Free State:

If originating from an accredited TB free herd - No test required, or

If herd of origin has had a complete negative herd test within 12 months - No test required, or

All other bovine require a negative TB test within 60 days of show.

Nursing calves may be shown on dam's negative CVI. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.

BRUCELLOSIS IN CATTLE

Cattle to be exhibited at West Virginia fairs, festivals, and shows must meet one of the following requirements:

From West Virginia: No test required if herd is not under quarantine for brucellosis. From Other States: (1) From Brucellosis Free State - No test required. Interstate CVI is required.

From other than a Brucellosis Free State:

Official Brucellosis vaccinates under 24 months (beef) and 20 months (dairy) of age from a herd not under brucellosis restrictions - No test required, or

Originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free herd - No test required, or

Complete herd test within one year before the show - No test required, or

A negative brucellosis test within 30 days. Nursing calves may be shown on the dam's negative CVI. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.

LEPTOSPIROSIS - CATTLE

Recommended: Vaccinations for *L. canicola*, *L. icterhaemorrhagiae*, *L. hardjo*, *L. pomona* and *L. grippityphosa*, are to be seriously considered.

BISON OR BOVINE FAIR, FESTIVAL & PUREBRED SALES

Nursing Animal Moves with Dam

No CVI required but must be listed on Dam's CVI

PUREBRED SALES

All cattle, except those from accredited herds or herds that have been tested within the last 12 months, shall have a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to sale. A nursing calf may move on dam's test or status.

For cattle from West Virginia, except those from certified herds or herds that have been tested within the last 12 months, shall have a negative brucellosis test within 30 days prior to sale unless officially brucellosis vaccinated. If vaccinated, they shall be subject to above rule after reaching 24 months (beef) and 20 months (dairy) of age.

Cattle from Free States, except those from certified herds, shall have a negative brucellosis test within 30 days prior to sale unless officially brucellosis vaccinated. If vaccinated, they shall be subject to above rule after reaching 24 months (beef) and 20 months (dairy) of age. Nursing calves may move on dam's test or status. All cattle must be verified progeny of herd. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.

Cattle from Class A states except those from certified herds must come from a herd of origin that has had a complete herd test within 12 months, but not less than 90 days prior to entry, or shall originate from a herd that has had a negative milk test conducted within six months, but not less than 90 days prior to entry and animals entering shall be negative to brucellosis test within 30 days of entry. Official vaccinates of beef breeds less than 24 months of age and official vaccinates of dairy breeds less than 20 months of age - no test required -but herd or origin must comply with this section (4) and all cattle must be verifiable progeny of the herd.

TUBERCULOSIS

From West Virginia

No test required, if herd is not under quarantine for tuberculosis From Other States

From Bovine Tuberculosis Free State - No test required. Interstate CVI is required. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certification.

From other than Bovine Tuberculosis Free State:

If originating from and accredited TB free herd - No test required, or

If herd of origin has had a complete negative herd test within 12 months - No test required, or

All other bovine require a negative TB test within 60 days of show.

Nursing calves may be shown on dam's negative CVI. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.

BRUCELLOSIS

From West Virginia:

No test required, if herd is not under quarantine for brucellosis. From Other States:

From Brucellosis Free State - No test required. Interstate CVI is required. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.

From other than a Brucellosis Free State:

Official brucellosis vaccinates under 24 months (beef) and 20 months (dairy) of age from a herd not under brucellosis restrictions - No test required, or

Originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free herd - No test required, or

Complete herd test within one year before the show - No test required, or

A negative brucellosis test within 30 days.

Nursing calves may be shown on the dam's negative CVI. All out of state cattle must have official identification listed on the health certificate.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR GOATS

All out-of-state goats must be accompanied by an Official CVI good for 30 days.

USDA regulation states that you must have an official Scrapie ID and the ID# must be listed on the CVI. All goats will be inspected by West Virginia Animal Health Officials.

TB & BRUCELLOSIS FOR GOATS

No test required.

GOATS FAIR & FESTIVAL

From In State • Official Scrapie ID • Honor Herd Certificate recommended

Out of State • Health Certificate (CVI) • Official Scrapie ID • No Test required

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR SHEEP

All out-of-state sheep must be accompanied by an Official CVI good for 30 days.

USDA regulation states that you must have an official Scrapie ID and the ID# must be listed on the CVI.

From West Virginia and From other States:

Must be accompanied by an official CVI, or

Have a current Honor Flock Certificate.

Market class of lambs to be inspected at fair by West Virginia Animal Health Officials.

Scrapie ID required for all sheep and goat.

SHEEP FAIR & FESTIVAL

Will Be Inspected by Animal Health Officials
Health Certificate (CVI) or current Honor Flock Certificate
Scrapie Identification

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR SWINE

All out-of-state swine must be accompanied by an official CVI good for 30 days.
From West Virginia: Any swine born in West Virginia, and have never left the state, will no longer require pseudorabies testing prior to being shown at any fair or festival in West Virginia.
From Other States: All swine must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for entry into West Virginia.

SWINE FAIR & FESTIVAL

In State: Pseudorabies not required.
Out of State: Health Certificate (CVI), Breeding swine need health certificate, negative brucellosis and negative pseudorabies.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR HORSES

All out-of-state horses must be accompanied by an official CVI good for 30 days. From West Virginia:
Must be uniquely identified, and
Have a negative Coggins' Test (from a USDA official approved laboratory) within the last 12 months.
From Other States:
Must be uniquely identified.
Accompanied by an approved CVI from the state of origin prior to show or fair, and
A negative Coggins' Test (from a USDA official approved laboratory) within the last 12 months.

RECOMMENDED EQUINE VACCINATION

Vaccination Programs should at least include Flu, Tetanus, Eastern & Western Encephalitis, West Nile Virus and Rabies.

NOTE: No animals from any herd or herds under restrictions will be permitted to show or sell. Animal Health Officials of the West Virginia Department of Agriculture reserve the right to examine any animal consigned and exclude animals from the show or sale that exhibit signs of disease.

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SALE OF 4-H AND FFA PROJECT ANIMALS

Saturday, August 22, 2026

(YOUTH ONLY)

A special sale of 4-H and FFA market steers, market lambs, market hogs, market goats, meat rabbits, and milk will be held in the Show Barn. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion market steer, market lamb, market hog, market goat and rabbit meat pens **MUST** be sold at the sale. In the rabbit species, only the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion meat pens will be sold. In the interest of the youth, if an exhibitor wins Grand Champion and Reserve Champion in the same species, he/she is permitted to sell another market animal in a different species. In the event that an exhibitor wins Grand Champion and/or Reserve Champion in different species, they have met their two species limit and are not permitted to sell any other market animal. An animal must have been in its proper class in order to sell. Milk, representative of the Grand Champion Dairy Female, will be sold as the last lot in the sale and is considered a separate entity.

Examples:

- John Doe wins Grand and Reserve Champion market goat; he is still able to sell his market lamb.
- Jane Doe wins Grand Champion market steer and Reserve Champion rabbit meat pen; she is not able to sell any other market animals.

The sale order for the 2026 Livestock Sale is:

1. Market Hogs
2. Market Steers
3. Rabbit Meat Pens
4. Market Goats
5. Market Lambs
6. Milk

ALL SALES ARE FINAL.

Seller Requirements to Participate:

In addition to any 4-H or FFA specific requirements, youth exhibitors must be present and involved in the following four events in order to participate in the sale.

- Youth exhibitor must be present and check their own animals in during the Saturday check-in for fair week.
- Youth exhibitor must participate in the showmanship class for their respective animal species.
- Youth exhibitor must show their market animal(s) in its respective market confirmation class.
- Youth livestock exhibitors must be present to sell their animals.

Should a conflict arise with participation in these events, the youth livestock exhibitor is required to submit a handwritten request to waive the policy and provide an explanation of their schedule conflict. Requests must be submitted in a timely fashion and as soon as possible to the Livestock Superintendent or to the Fair Manager. A committee comprised of the Livestock Superintendent, Livestock Sale Chairman and the Species Department Superintendent shall meet to consider the request. Each request will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Should any conflict of interest exist between the exhibitor and members of the committee, such committee members shall excuse themselves and another committee member shall be appointed by the Fair President.

Sale Requirements

- Steers – Must weigh at least 900 lbs. and grade PRIME, CHOICE or SELECT.
- Hogs – Must weigh between 225 lbs. to 295 lbs. and grade 1 or 2.
- Lambs – Must weigh at least 100 lbs. and grade BLUE.
- Goats – Must weigh at least 50 lbs. and grade PRIME, CHOICE or SELECT.
- Rabbits – Must win Grand or Reserve Champion Meat Pen.
- Milk – Must win Supreme Champion Dairy Female.

The Jefferson County Fair will deduct 5% from all animals sold to pay for sale expenses and advertising.

ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP

JR. Round Robin Contest

Thursday, August 20th, 2026, in the Show Barn at 4:00 p.m.

RULES

1. The first place Junior Showmanship winners in the areas of SHEEP, BEEF, SWINE, GOAT, DAIRY, and HORSE will compete in the Round Robin Showmanship contest for the opportunity to be named Supreme Junior Showman.
2. After each showmanship contest, the Superintendent of their species will notify the winner of their right to participate in the Round Robin Contest. The member has one hour to confirm their participation.
3. If for any reason the first-place showman cannot or will not participate, then the second-place individual will be invited.
4. A safety meeting will be held 30 minutes prior to the start of the contest at the Show Barn.
5. Members are not permitted to use their own animals. Animals will be randomly assigned.
6. Junior Round Robin participants will show 4 species. Those 4 species for 2026 will be: GOAT, DAIRY, HORSE & SHEEP. Species will change each year.
7. All contestants will enter the ring with the correct species and show the animal for 5-10 minutes before moving to the next species. With the exception of HORSE and DAIRY, animals should be shown as market livestock.
8. Contestants will be graded on their ability to show the animal, and communication skills with the judge. Contestants will be ranked, and the contestant with the lowest score will win. Rankings will not be announced.
9. In the event of a tie breaker, the judge will ask a clarification question(s) to the top scoring individuals.
10. Contestants must wear clean jeans (black or blue), boots, and a clean polo or button-up shirt with sleeves.
11. Once a member has won the title of Supreme Junior Showman, they are ineligible to compete in the Junior Round Robin again.

Senior Round Robin Contest

Friday, August 21st, 2026, in the Show Barn at 6:00 p.m.

RULES

1. The first place Senior Showmanship winners in the areas of SHEEP, BEEF, SWINE, GOAT, DAIRY, and HORSE will compete in the Round Robin Showmanship contest for the opportunity to be named Supreme Senior Showman.
2. If the winner of the Previous Winner showmanship division differs from the winner of Senior Showmanship, the Previous Winner will also be invited to participate in the Round Robin.
3. After each showmanship contest, the Superintendent of their species will notify the winner of their right to participate in the Round Robin Contest. The member has one hour to confirm their participation.
4. If for any reason the first-place showman cannot or will not participate, then the second-place individual will be invited.
5. A safety meeting will be held 30 minutes prior to the start of the contest at the Show Barn.
6. Members are not permitted to use their own animals. Animals will be assigned randomly. Senior Round Robin participants will show all six species of SHEEP, BEEF, SWINE, GOAT, DAIRY, and HORSE.
7. All contestants will enter the ring with the correct species and show the animal for 5-10 minutes before moving to the next species. With the exception of HORSE and DAIRY, animals should be shown as market livestock.
8. Contestants will be graded on their ability to show the animal, and communication skills with the judge. Contestants will be ranked, and the contestant with the lowest score will win. Rankings will not be announced.
9. In the event of a tie breaker, the score of the species won by the top scoring contestants will be discarded.
10. Contestants must wear clean jeans (black or blue), boots, and a clean polo shirt or button-up shirt with sleeves.
11. Once a member has won the title of Supreme Senior Showman, they are ineligible to compete again.

HERDSMANSHIP PROGRAM

A herdsmanship program will be in effect to ensure that the cleanliness of pens/stalls and animals are kept to the standards of the Jefferson County Fair. Superintendents will be inspecting the barns and will use the following system if they find a stall/pen that needs attention:

- **Green card** – card will be placed on pen/stall which indicates that the stall/pen needs attention (1st warning)
- **Yellow card** – card will be placed on pen/stall which indicates that the exhibitor has not made an effort to improve the condition of the pen (2nd warning)
- **Red card** – card will be placed on pen/stall and superintendent will notify exhibitor that they cannot sell their animal and must leave the fairgrounds due to no effort being made to improve condition of area

ALL ANIMALS MUST GO HOME AFTER RECEIVING A RED CARD AND NO PREMIUMS WILL BE AWARDED.

If an exhibitor finds a card on their pen/stall, they must talk to the superintendent of the department to see what improvements need to be made.

YOUTH AND OPEN CLASS HERDSMAN AWARDS

Youth and Open Class Herdsman Awards, and one Honorable mention awards will be presented in the beef, goat, dairy, sheep, swine and fiber divisions of the Livestock Department. A stable award and one Honorable Mention award will be presented in the horse division. The following will be judged for the duration of the Fair to determine the award:

- Cleanliness and care of exhibit.
- Cleanliness of aisle and area adjacent to exhibit.
- Condition, fitting, and presentation of animals in the barn and show ring.
- Personal contribution to the success of the Show in which the exhibitor is participating.
- Attitude and spirit of cooperation with other exhibitors and fair management.
- Promptness in show ring.

This award will not be presented if no one is deemed deserving.

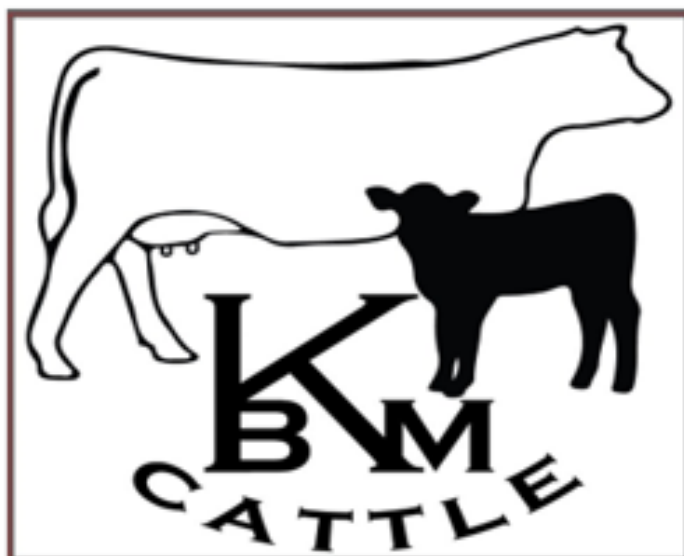

RULES AND REGULATIONS:

1. Animals shown in Registered or Recorded Grade classes must be accompanied by the original registration certificate and must be in the exhibitor's name for all animals born before March 31, 2026. Goats born April 1, 2026, or after, may show in Registered or Recorded Grade classes, providing their Dam and Sire are a Registered or a Recorded Grade animal and must be accompanied by registration, recordation, or stamped by ADGA, duplicate applications, etc.
2. Unrecorded Grades will be shown in YOUTH (4-H and FFA) Classes only.
3. Only one entry will be permitted in each of the following classes: Produce of Dam and Dairy Herd.
4. All goats must be dehorned and have a collar. No horns: small scurs allowed.
5. No body clippings! All goats must be body clipped at home before you bring them to the fairgrounds. You may trim your goats only, such as around the tail, ears, udders, etc.
6. No "cooling" or "icing" goats at ANY time. While at the Jefferson County Fair, the use of water colder than the hydrants at the fairgrounds, i.e., cooler, refrigerated, ice, etc. is NOT allowed. The use of ice packs, cooling products, or sprays that contain alcohol are NOT allowed, i.e., "cool brace", "cool breeze", etc., including cold towels. If the superintendent is notified by the judge that a goat has been "iced" or "cooled" that goat will be disqualified and must leave the fairgrounds.
7. Hanging or "Strangling" goat (aka – Extreme showmanship) – All goats must have FOUR feet on the ground at all times to include but not limited to, in pens, at ringside, exercising, during showmanship, market classes and breeding classes. Exhibitors may move feet to set the goat up but then all FOUR feet must be placed back on the ground. Exhibitors will receive a warning if they are found violating this rule. Second offenses will result in automatic exhibitor disqualification from showing the animal and that goat must leave the fairgrounds.

All classes except Champion and Reserve will pay 6 places: \$10, \$8, \$6, \$4, \$3, and \$2. All Champions and Reserves will receive a Rosette.

1. Full Blood and Percentage Boer will show together.
2. Pygmy and Pygmy Cross will have their own show.
3. Meat Goats are Boer, Boer Cross, or Pygmy goats. All Meat and Market Goats must have a Scrapie Tag in their ear before their arrival to Jefferson County Fair, NO EXCEPTIONS.
4. Goats can only be shown once in their respective class as a dairy, meat, or market animal.
5. Recommend Market Goats kidded after December 1, 2025.
6. All grooming stands are to remain between the goat and swine barns.
7. Market Goat should be slick shorn (3/8") at time of arrival at fairgrounds. No body clipping on fairgrounds
8. No pronged Chain Collars allowed!
9. All entries must be in accordance with State Health Rules.
10. No Bedding Furnished.
11. Classes will be separated for BOER and BOER CROSS as well as for PYGMY
12. Market goats can be a doe or a wether.
13. Market Goats can have horns, need to be tipped prior to arrival on fairgrounds; dehorning is acceptable.
14. The Judge may ask exhibitors to tum their goat loose in the show ring to be judged. Be prepared.
15. No "cooling" or "icing" goats at ANY time. While at the Jefferson County Fair, the use of water colder than the hydrants at the fairgrounds, i.e., cooler, refrigerated, ice, etc. is NOT allowed. The use of ice packs, cooling products, or sprays that contain alcohol are NOT allowed, i.e., "cool brace", "cool breeze", etc., including cold towels. If the superintendent is notified by the judge that a goat has been "iced" or "cooled" that goat will be disqualified and must leave the fairgrounds.
16. Hanging or "Strangling" goat (aka – Extreme showmanship) – All goats must have FOUR feet on the ground at all times to include but not limited to, in pens, at ringside, exercising, during showmanship, market classes and breeding classes. 1. Registration papers may be requested and examined by Beef Division Officials during the entry process.
2. All Beef animals exhibited will be shown individually in their respective individual classes.
3. Youth and Open Classes to be shown separately.
4. Breed specific classes apply to Registered and Commercial Cattle.
5. Heifer calves can show as Breeding Cattle or Feeder Calves, but not both.
6. Weights will not be used for Breeding Classes.
7. All Official Bull Classes are for registered animals only
8. Youth entries will automatically be entered into corresponding open classes as competition allows.
9. Feeder calves must weigh 325 – 650 pounds.
10. Feeder calves must have visible ear tag as identification.

12. Each Purebred Breed Must have 2 or More Entries to Qualify for a Separate Show and all entries must have registration papers to show by Breed
13. For “Cow and Calf Classes” Calf must be the Cow's most recent natural born calf and be born on or after January 1, 2025, to be eligible and cannot be Purebred
14. Market Steers shall NOT have horns
15. All 4-H/FFA project animals shall be entered into Youth Division Classes. All Market Steers project animals must have been identified at the official weigh-in prior to this fair year.
16. Fitting & Grooming Rule - Cattle in the market steer show and sale will be exhibited clean, dry and unfitted. Cattle are to be clipped, (before show day), washed, and brushed or combed. No other materials may be used. On show day, each youth exhibitor is to prepare his or her own animal for exhibit with possibly a minimal amount of assistance from parents or other 4-H or FFA livestock exhibitors or a fair official.

RULES & REGULATIONS:

1. Rams shown in any class other than a crossbred class must be registered with registration paperwork on hand and approved by the Sheep Department Superintendent.
2. Sheep shown in any youth class must be accounted for in their exhibitor's 4-H or FFA records. Verification may be necessary.
3. Exhibitors should see that sheep entered for premiums have been handled sufficiently so as to admit being closely inspected by the judge without struggle. If necessary, department officials will divide market classes by weight.
4. All sheep oiled or blackened shall be excluded from competition.
5. All market lambs must be in the sheep barn area 1 hour prior to the start of the show and remain in that area until the show is complete. Lambs in line (as directed by superintendents) are the only authorized animals allowed outside of the sheep barn area. Failure to follow any rules could result in disqualification.
6. No "cooling" or "icing" sheep at ANY time. While at the Jefferson County Fair, the use of water colder than the hydrants at the fairgrounds, i.e., cooler, refrigerated, ice, etc. is NOT allowed. The use of ice packs, cooling products, or sprays that contain alcohol are NOT allowed, i.e., "cool brace", "cool breeze", etc., including cold towels. If the superintendent is notified by the judge that a lamb has been "iced" or "cooled" that lamb will be disqualified and must leave the fairgrounds.
7. Hanging or "Strangling" sheep (aka – Extreme showmanship) – All sheep must have FOUR feet on the ground at all times to include but not limited to, in pens, at ringside, exercising, during showmanship, market classes and breeding classes. Exhibitors may move feet to set the lamb up but then all FOUR feet must be placed back on the ground. Exhibitors will receive a warning if they are found violating this rule. Second offenses will result in automatic exhibitor disqualification from showing the animal and that lamb must leave the fairgrounds.

Revised WVU Extension Policy Effective February 1989:

POLICY:

Effective immediately, all participants* (who have not reached their 21st birthday as of January 1 or who are currently 4-H members) in any mounted 4-H horse activity or show in West Virginia must wear approved U.S. Pony Club, Inc. or ASTM Protective headgear (logo stamped in or sewn into the inside of the helmet liner) with harness and chin strap fastened.

POLICY APPLICATION

1. The brand, selection, approval, use, fit and standards of the headgear shall be determined for 4-H members/youth by the parent or guardian.
2. All 4-H members/youth in any 4-H mounted horse event at local county, district and/or state levels. For example: If the participant is mounted in or out of the ring at a horse show this policy applies.
3. It is recognized that the availability of appropriate safety headgear for a specific riding style may be a problem. Therefore, judges will be instructed that the suitability of safety headgear for a specific class is not to be a factor in placing in that class.
4. Persons who are over 21 years of age taking part in 4-H sponsored shows are strongly encouraged but not required to wear protective headgear.
5. Failure to comply will result in being disqualified from further participation in the event.

6. County extension agents are responsible for communicating the policy to the appropriate clientele and enforcing the policy.

*All persons (youth) who have not reached their 21st birthday as of January 1, or who are current 4-H members.

CLASS SPECIFICATIONS:

Every class offered herein shall be primarily run by the rules and regulations of the current USEF rulebook, where applicable, and further shall be conducted and judged accordingly. The judge's decision is always final.

ALL CLASSES

Require that entry forms and waivers must be completed for each horse and rider combination prior to the start of the class. Management reserves the right to split or combine any class due to size.

BEGINNER CLASSES:

Open to any rider in first or second year of showing. To be shown at the walk and jog or trot. These exhibitors are not allowed to cross enter in any class that is required to canter or lope.

JUNIOR CLASSES:

Open to riders age 17 and under as of January 1, 2026

Open to riders age 18 and over as of January 1, 2026

LEADLINE CLASSES:

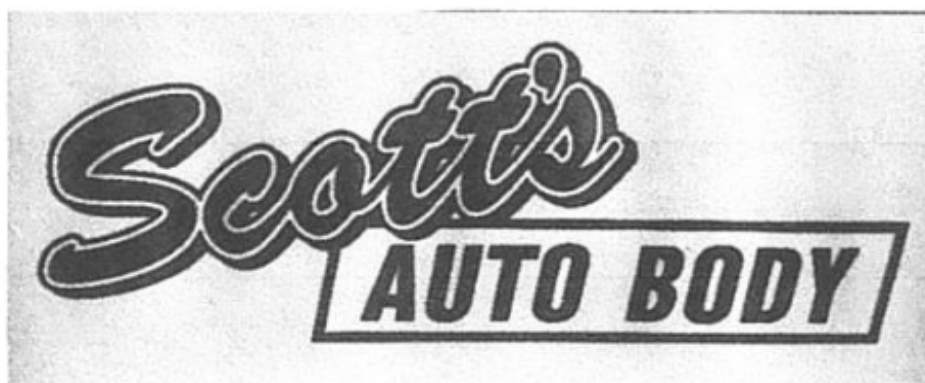

RULES & REGULATIONS:

1. The competition is open to Jefferson County residents and to Jefferson County 4-H and FFA project members.
2. Poultry MUST be blood-tested on **Thursday, July 30st & Friday, July 31st** from 7:00 – 9:00 p.m. each evening. Testing CANNOT be completed on entry day. All poultry will be "banded" after testing.
3. No entries accepted after blood testing dates. Please hand-deliver entry forms on blood test dates.
4. Poultry are to be brought to the Fair from 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 15 and released on Sunday, August 23, 6:00 – 10:00 a.m.
5. Exhibitors may only enter one animal per class.
6. Department personnel reserve the right to limit entries if space is a problem.
7. The department reserves the right to reject any entry which is diseased or otherwise undesirable. Birds not in full adult plumage will not be accepted. Poultry with dipped wings will be disqualified.
8. All poultry exhibits must comply with regulations of the West Virginia Department of Agriculture.
9. Feed for poultry, while on exhibit, will be furnished. Animals will be fed and watered by the exhibitors and department personnel. Be sure to sign up to help at least once during the fair.
10. Judging will occur at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, August 16. Birds will be judged based on the most current breed standards. The decision of the judge is final.
11. Farm flock consists of a cock and three (3) hens. Flocks may be all of one breed or mixed purebred. No Bantams
12. Meat Bird entries consist of: Three Chickens, or Two Ducks, or one Broad Breasted Turkey.
13. A Pair consists of one cock and one hen of the same purebred variety.
14. No Mixed Breed Poultry. ONLY Purebred standard or bantam poultry will be accepted. Hybrid Sexlink varieties may only be entered as Egg Production flocks.
15. FFA and 4-H exhibits must be part of a project. Additional exhibits from that individual will be placed in Open class.
16. Young birds are those animals which are less than 1 year old. Old birds are one year old and older.
17. FFA & 4H Project groups must be a farm flock, egg production flock or meat birds.
18. Entries of eggs must be the following weights: Small – 1 ½ oz.; Medium – 1 ¾ oz.; Large – 2 oz.; Extra Large – 2 ¼ oz. Egg Scales will be available at the fair. Chicken eggs only, Full dozen, pointed end down, in clean cartons.
19. Exhibitors will be responsible for the cleanliness and addition of bedding to their pens; Final clean up on Sunday, August 23.

Each class will pay: \$4.00 - First; \$3.00 - Second; \$2.00 - Third. Farm flocks will pay - \$10.00- First; \$8.00- Second; \$6.00- Third; \$4.00 - Fourth. Pairs will pay -\$5.00- First; \$4.00- Second; \$3.00- Third; \$2.00 - Fourth. Rare Breeds as defined in Section I will pay \$7.00 - First; \$6.00 - Second; \$5.00 - Third.

All classes will pay 3 places: \$4, \$3, \$2. Exceptions: classes 4, 20, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28 will pay 3 places: \$5, \$3, \$1. Exception: classes 29 and 30 will pay 3 places: \$20, \$10, \$5.

HONEY EXHIBITION RULES:

- 1 jar or container for each category per person
- Density (moisture) should be 15.5% - 18.5% - anything higher will be disqualified automatically
- Liquid honey should be displayed in a 16oz Queenline glass jar.
- Cut Comb honey should be displayed in a clear plastic container.
- Chunk Honey should be in a pint glass jar container. Chunk must be one piece approx. 1/3 volume of container.
- Frame of honey should be a complete frame enclosed display case (cases will be provided).
- Creamed honey should be displayed in 16oz glass jar.

HINTS ON HOW TO SELECT FRUIT FOR EXHIBITS:

- Fruit must be free from all defects or blemishes.
- Fruit must be typical in size and color of that variety chosen.
- Fruit must be uniform.
- Fruit must have all stems in place.

The exhibitor will furnish own wood display box 4" deep and 20"x20" square (outside dimensions). Please put name and exhibitor number on bottom. Boxes are judged on appearance, quality, how well displayed in box, and other considerations by the Judge.

Helpful Hints: Wash, clean and trim all entries. Shelled beans should be contained in a Ziploc bag. Remove tomato stems on all tomatoes except for the entries in the category Tomatoes, largest by weight. Rhubarb leaves must be trimmed off neatly and the stems should be pulled from the plant at the base, not cut from the base; sunflowers should have a uniform appearance but no blossom parts.

Please check the number of specimens required for each class, there have been some changes and incorrect numbers cannot be accepted.

Exhibit that becomes spoiled shall be removed and disposed of.

1. This show is open to any residents of Jefferson County.
2. Exhibitor numbers can be obtained at the Ruritan Pavilion on Saturday, August 16 from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Entries will be accepted between these hours at the Flower Show Building (No. 5).
3. Since the show runs throughout the fair week, cut flower exhibits will be removed as they expire. All other exhibits must be removed after 9:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 22.
4. Only one entry is permitted in each class or subclass.
5. No plant material on the "Let Live" Section of the West Virginia Conservation List may be used.
6. Each entry must be checked by the Classification Committee and receive an entry card before it is passed to the Entries Committee. The Placement Committee will place the exhibit on the show bench.
7. Entries which do not conform to the schedule will be displayed but not judged.
8. The judging will begin at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 16. Only necessary personnel will be allowed during judging.
9. The decision of the judges shall be final.
10. All classes will pay up to 3 places: \$4, \$3, \$2.

YOUTH HORTICULTURE RULES:

1. All Horticulture rules apply to the Youth Division.
2. Any youth aged 6-18 may participate in this Division.
3. Youth exhibitors aged 6-18 are permitted to enter specimens in the Adult Horticulture Division if no class is listed in the Youth Division.

DESIGN DEVISION RULES:

1. Advance registration is required in all design classes and may be made by calling or emailing Leigh Koonce no later than August 10th.
2. Containers should be marked with the exhibitor's name.
3. Bases, background material and underlays may be used. Accessories are permitted in all classes.
4. No artificial flowers, fruit, or foliage may be used. Live plant material may not be painted.

70117 HAPPY RETREAT – A traditional mass design

Located in Charles Town, this property was owned by Charles Washington, George Washington's younger brother. A two and a half story classical revival structure, it was built in 1780.

American Traditional Mass Design conforms to the American Traditional style and uses large quantities of plant material with a closed silhouette in addition to plant material being integrated and not grouped.

70118 THE LITTLE HOUSE IN SHEPHERDSTOWN – A miniature design

A well-known landmark in the town, the little house is a favorite for tourists and locals alike.

This arrangement must not exceed five inches in any direction but is otherwise open to interpretation by the designer. The arrangement will be staged on a pedestal.

Characteristics: Miniatures can be of any style or any design ("period," oriental, mass line, etc.) Employ all the rules of artistic design. Scale and proportion are the most important. The largest bloom should not exceed one third the size of container and the arrangement should be approximately one to one-and-a half times the height or width of the container. A small amount of plant material is desirable. Avoid crowding. Conditioning is essential.

70019 SHANNONDALE SPRINGS – A tailgate design with late 19th century elements

A resort located on the Blue Ridge Mountain, Shannondale Springs had several iterations. For the purposes of this design, please focus on the rebuilding of the hotel in 1890. Accessories should resemble those available in the late 19th century.

A tailgate arrangement should incorporate elements of both a "cook-out" or packed meal and natural, roadside plant material. Plant material should be wildflowers and other naturalistic setting varieties. The accessories of the basket or meal shouldn't overshadow the plant material.

Please do not include real, perishable food.

70120 WIZARD CLIP AT MIDDLEWAY — A naturalistic landscape design

A well-known local legend, which featured a mysterious stranger, death, poltergeist activities, failing livestock, a barn burning, and haunted sheers the area now known as Middleway played host to Wizard Clip.

A naturalistic landscape design represents a large view such as a wilderness panorama and is based on nature and capturing the essence of a natural landscape scene. The design does not seem contrived or artificial but represents a slice of nature. The plant material should be of high quality but does not have to be a horticultural show quality specimen. The proper scale is vital for these designs to be successful.

70121 STORER COLLEGE – A table arrangement

A school opened for African American students and located in Harpers Ferry, Storer College quickly become a preeminent educational institution. The forerunner of the NAACP, the Niagara Movement, was founded here. The school was open from 1867-1955.

A tailgate arrangement typically incorporates a place setting, but in this design, the exhibitor is challenged to incorporate the classroom into the table arrangement. Accessories should evoke a sense of school, education, and be in keeping with the historic nature of Storer College.

QUALIFICATIONS:

1. Tractors must be 1959 in production or older to qualify as an antique in order to pull in the following classes: 3000, 3500, 4000, 4500, 5000, 5500, 6000, 6500, & 7000 and will run 4 MPH with 3 MPH rules.
2. DRIVERS/PULLERS MUST BE AT LEAST 10 YEARS OLD AND MUST BE ABLE TO REACH ALL CONTROLS AND BRAKES.
3. Registration will close 30 minutes before the pull starts.
4. Tractors are classes for pulling by weight. The driver weighing the tractor must pull the tractor in that class. To enter a class competitively, tractor plus drive must not exceed the weight for the class they are pulling by more than 100 pounds.

TRACTOR RULES:

1. Tire tread that has been cut, ground, or altered in any way other than normal wear will not be permitted with a 18.4 X 38 maximum tire size.
2. Tractors must have the same engine make and the number of cylinders that the tractor was produced with.
3. Outside components of the engine that would alter the horsepower of the tractor must be to factory specifications. (Ex. Carburetor, distributor, magneto, manifold, or fan)
4. Tractors must have a stock cooling system in operation (no aluminum radiators or electric fans permitted).
5. Wheelie bars are mandatory.
6. All tractors must be equipped with a hood and grill if standard, (side curtains are optional).
 - a. Standard components (frames, transmission cases, rear ends and housing, front ends and gas tanks).

OPERATOR RULES:

1. A tractor operator must be able to operate all tractor controls from a seated position. Decision on small children will be made by the track official and/or safety committee.
 - a. Any child under 10 years of age may not pull.
 - b. Any child under 12 years of age must have wheelie bars and a kill switch and may be subject to a driver's test.
 - c. There must be a signed waiver for any child under the age of 18.
2. Tractor tires must stay within the boundaries of the course or will be disqualified (unless test puller).
3. Drivers must be seated at all times while pulling. Drivers are not to put their hands through the steering wheel while pulling to hold the throttle in place. Track officials and safety committee have the authority to enforce rules and all decisions are final.
4. Drivers must be properly dressed; this includes shirts, blouses, pants, shorts, and shoes. no open-toed shoes.
5. Before hooking the tractor to the sled and after the pull when unhooking, the tractor must be in neutral, and the driver must raise his/her hands in the air. Driver is to remain in this position until a person hooking sled to tractor indicates he has completed the hook-up.
6. After participant has begun his or her pull, changing of ratios of power transmission, or torque amplifiers, are ok.
7. Contestants will be allowed a second attempt if he or she does not pull beyond the 50' mark.
8. Pull-offs are allowed one attempt only.
9. If driver gets a full pull they must wait until the class is over to weigh up for the next class.
10. The first puller in each class is a test puller and has the option to drop to third position. The driver must tell the track official before leaving the track if he/she wants to pull in third position. Test puller may return in third position if disqualified for out-of-bounds, dropped weights, and speed first attempt.
11. There is a speed of no more than 4 mph. The first horn blow will be a warning the second horn blow on the same pull will be disqualification for that class. No speed monitoring devices are allowed.
12. After track official indicates sled is ready, contestant has three minutes to position tractor for hook-up or drop down.
13. The duration of the pull is anytime the tractor is hooked to the sled.
14. Track officials must tell the puller status of pull before tractor leaves the track.
15. The safety committee has the right to inspect any and all tractors at any time.

GENERAL CONTEST RULES:

1. Track officials and the safety committee have the authority to enforce rules and all decisions are final.
2. Wherever possible and practical, pulling track will be at least 20 feet wide with a 10-foot zone on each side. The 10-foot safety zone must be kept clear of all people during the pulling event.
3. Any competitor or any member of his/her crew found to be under the influence of alcohol, drugs, or having a measurable blood alcohol content during contest activities shall be barred from any further involvement or participation in an event.
4. Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated; offenders will be asked to leave the event immediately without a refund. This is non-negotiable.
5. Any person protesting a tractor must be pulling in the same class as the tractor that is being protested. His or her tractor will be inspected first.

A waiver must be completed for all children ages 10 to 17 and is provided in this catalog.

1. Tractors competing in pull must be from Berkeley, Jefferson, or Morgan Counties. (We ask for honesty of drivers that tractors are owned by WV residents and not on "loan" from out of state for our event) All drivers must have a valid WV driver's license.
2. Entry Fee \$10.00 per class.
3. 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th place in all stock and stock turbo classes.
4. Scale will open at 5:00 p.m.
5. Tractors will be divided according to the following weights:
 - Class No. 1 – 5,500 lb. Stock
 - Class No. 2 – 7,500 lb. Stock, not to exceed 80 hp (Drawbar)
 - Class No. 3 – 9,500 lb. Stock, not to exceed 100 hp
 - Class No. 4 – 12,500 lb. Stock and Turbo
 - Class No. 5 – 15,500 lb. Stock and Turbo
 - Class No. 6 – 18,500 lb. Stock and Turbo and Natural Aspirated
 - Class No. 7 – 13,000 lb.
 - Class No. 8 – 20,000 lb.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Each tractor may only be entered in two classes, and only once in each class.
2. Number one puller will be test puller and may take pull if weight machine is okay, or he may pull in third position. If the weight machine needs further adjustment, the first pull after each adjustment will be treated as number one puller. All decisions on re-pulls must be made before the tractor in question is unhooked from sled. On any repull caused by a contest malfunction, puller at his discretion may drop back three positions. Any disqualifications on first attempt bars a second attempt.
3. No one allowed on track except for track officials and contestants: no helpers. Track is defined as an area within 25 feet in any direction of contest course boundaries.
4. The contestant must pull at a position drawn within three (3) minutes of time sled is in readiness. Any delay will mean disqualification. If the presiding judge is notified before the preceding contestant makes his pull, he may drop a contestant having mechanical problems three positions. This may be done only once per contestant per class.
5. All pulls must start with a tight hitch; no jerking permitted. Contestants will be allowed two consecutive attempts and 75 feet to start the sled.
6. Tractor must remain within boundaries of contest course during the pull or will be disqualified.
7. Every puller must have a hitch opening of 3" wide X 3 3/4" deep
8. For all motorsport events being held in the motorsport arena at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds, ALL vehicles (Tractors and Trucks) WITH TURBO CHARGES MUST be cross bolted as close to the impeller as can be by a minimum Grade 8 – 3/8" bolt (if not in the cast part of the turbo housing immediately as it turns to the exhaust tubing). This applies to all vehicles with open and straight exhaust. This does not apply to vehicles with a muffler.

SECTION II: SAFETY AND TRACTOR OPERATION

1. Tractors must be always operated in a safe manner.
2. Operator must remain seated during the pull and must have complete control of the tractor at all times.
3. Consumption of alcoholic beverages prior to pulling will mean disqualification. No alcoholic beverages allowed in track area.
4. The tractor must be stopped immediately upon signal from the judge. The pull shall be considered over when forward motion of the load stops.
5. Excessive loss of liquid by a tractor while in forward motion during contest on the track will be cause for disqualification unless due to internal breakage. (Excessive is defined as any steam or intermittent steam discharged on the track.)
6. All tractors must be in neutral, or park (transmission sector) while being hitched or unhitched.

SECTION III: STOCK AND TURBO TRACTORS

1. Prior contributions not included but also not factored in.
2. Contests open to farm tractors with rubber tires. No dual tires, tire studs or chains permitted. All power must be transmitted through rear tires.
3. No portion of the tractor shall interfere with the sled or sled hitch during a pull.
4. Each tractor may only be entered in two classes, and only once in each class.
5. Stock tractors mean: Naturally aspirated stock block tractor with no visual engine modification. Must have standard block and crankcase for make and model being entered. Classes must conform with the engine being entered. No cubic inch limit.
6. No external engine modifications including changes in throttle linkage (hot springs, etc.) different carburetors, fuel pumps, external air routing, etc. Stock Tractors limited to 3000 RPM. Tractors in question may be checked. (EXCEPTION – 13,000 class is excluded from this rule.)
7. If the committee doubts legality of stock entry, or upon protest of another contestant in that class, the contestant must verify 150 units of tractor in question have been manufactured (Notarized statement from the manufacturer) furnish part numbers and prove to the committee's satisfaction that they have a legal entry. (EXCEPTION – 13,000 class is excluded from this rule.)
8. All weights must be safely secured to tractor. No weight or weight frame may extend over 24 inches beyond the front of the tractor. No weights may extend beyond the rear most point of the rear tires. (String across tires to check if doubted.) All ballast lost while on the track is cause for disqualification, unless done after forward movement of sled and tractor has stopped. (Pull is over.) NO LOOSE WEIGHTS INSIDE OF TRACTOR CABS.
9. No Superchargers, (even if standard equipment). No pressurized fuels except LP Gas, no oxidizers.
10. All stock tractors must be equipped with original style hood or grill.
11. All exhaust must discharge vertically upward above the highest point of the tractor with exception of Roll Bars and be securely attached. Rain Caps may not be used.
12. Minimum drawbar length 18 inches from center of rear wheel to point of hook. The drawbar must be stationary in all directions. Not over 24 inches from top of hitch parallel to the ground for 15,500 & 18,500. Not over 20 inches for 5,500, 7,500, 9,500, 12,500 & 13,000.
13. All engine fans must be shrouded with steel 1/16 inch or thicker, 360 degrees.
14. Oversize rims and cut tires will be permitted on stock tractors.
15. Turbocharger must be under hood and of size and type that are used for farming. The decision of judge or judges will be final regarding whether a tractor is a turbocharged farm tractor or a super stock.
16. No super stock tractors allowed

SECTION IV-STOCK TRUCKS 7,000 lbs. Gasoline, 10,000 lbs. Diesel

1. Truck Classes are open to drivers residing in Jefferson County, WV, Berkeley County, WV, Washington County, MD, Clarke County, VA, Frederick County, VA, and Loudoun County, VA. Must have valid a Driver's License (in their possession and prepared to show at registration) and valid Registration/License plate on truck.
2. Trucks must be always operated in a safe manner, NO passengers in truck or track.
3. Loss of ballast, parts, excessive fluid will result in a disqualification unless after forward momentum is completed.
4. Seatbelts required worn while pulling.
5. All trucks must have D.O.T. tires.
6. All hitches must be safe, secure and no more than 24" in height. Must exceed body or bumper by at least 4" and no more than 12". Hitch point opening must be at least 3" wide X 3 3/4" deep
7. No front weights or weight brackets. No weight in cab. All weight must be in bed of truck.
8. No extreme engine or drivetrain modifications allowed, (to be determined by tech officials) appearance bolt on items are allowed (wheels and tires, roll bars, bumpers, etc.). Hood stacks are allowed on diesel trucks but must be cross bolted.
9. All decisions of tech officials final.
10. Have to be inspected by tech officials and have approval certificate before registering truck.
11. \$10 entry fee per class.
12. Trucks will be divided into two (2) classes: Gasoline and Diesel.

SECTION V-GENERAL RULES - TRUCK

1. Any truck can pull in one of the classes only (stock, modified stock or modified) but no combination of any two classes.
2. Violation of any rule will result in disqualification.
3. Contests be governed by the judge or judges with all decisions final. Judges have a right to stop or disqualify any truck that is operated in any manner deemed unsafe.
4. Any unruly behavior will result in that person being removed from the Fairgrounds.
5. Any use of alcoholic beverages by driver or crew will result in removal from Fairgrounds.
6. Unsportsmanlike conduct will result in disqualification and forfeit of entry money and any winnings.
7. NO EXHIBITION PULLS.
8. No shifting of manual transmission trucks in any of the three classes.

The decision of the judges is final and may not be appealed. Calls of judgement are not subject to appeal and shall be final.

EVENT REGISTRATION:

- Registration will occur in person at the motorsport's office located next to the pulling track/performance area.
- Registration will begin 1 hour prior to the event.
- Participants, their parents, and the vehicle should enter at Admission Gate 7 (Pit Area Gate)

RULES:

1. Participants must be no younger than age 4 and no older than age 9 on the date of the event.
2. Any regular electric power wheel is allowed.
3. Stock batteries may be replaced with a battery not to exceed (1) 20-volt battery. May be located under hood or trunk but must be secured and covered at all times. All batteries will be checked to ensure they do not exceed 20-volt.
4. MUST wear a helmet. Bicycle helmets ARE allowed.
5. Must have some form of seatbelt.
6. Must be completely stock with no modifications other than those listed in these rules.
7. No modification to frames or added sheet metal.
8. No lowering or raising the front or rear.
9. No passengers allowed.
10. No studs or screws in tires.
11. No remote controls can be used.
12. Track officials will aid competitors to get those unstuck.
13. Winners to be determined by track officials.
14. All track official decisions are final and not subject to appeal.

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS:

1. Each driver must fill out an entry blank. All drivers must supply their own car. Only one (1) entry per Person per class.
2. All rules and regulations must be observed. Track operators or promoters reserve the right to approve or reject any and all entries.
3. All drivers 16 or 17 years old must have a notarized release form signed by his or her parent or guardian. No one under 16 years old can drive or be in track area. All drivers should be prepared to show valid driver's license. (DRIVER'S PERMIT PROHIBITED)
4. All persons must sign a release form and receive a pit pass to be permitted in the pit area or on the track. Drivers only receive free pit pass upon registration of cars on day of show. All pit passes are \$10.00 other than drivers. The driver's pit pass fee (\$10) will be taken off the entry fee.
5. **The PIT area is for Derby vehicles, Vehicles trailering Derby vehicles or service truck. SPECTATOR (pit crew/friends/family/etc.) vehicles must park in designated parking areas OUTSIDE of the pit area.**
6. Entry fee - \$20.00 per car. No refunds.
7. Both driver & mechanic must be present when the vehicle is inspected and certified. Also, both must be present at driver-mechanic meeting held one hour before the event.
8. Any driver or crew member disobeying the rules will cause his or her car to be disqualified. Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated and will be grounds for disqualification. Drivers are responsible for the actions of their crew members.
9. No alcoholic beverages or illegal substances (narcotics) are allowed in pit area or on the fairgrounds. Drivers or pit crews caught drinking or engaging with illegal substances (narcotics) disqualifies their car and driver.
10. The promoter and/or Jefferson County Fair Association will not be held responsible for any cars, parts or personal property before, during and after the show or overnight.
11. Cars may be left at the grounds for pick up by local salvage people. If you want your car, make sure you load it on your trailer and remove it from the ground immediately after the derby. All cars left will be removed from grounds.
12. The total purse for the entire event is \$3,500.00. This money will be broken down into heat winners, main event and Bang Up. First Place only in each heat gets money and trophy. This person is eligible for the main event.

DRIVERS ENTRY:

1. Entry and consent forms will be available here, on the Jefferson County Fair website or at the Fairgrounds on the night of the event. Please be at the track for inspection and sign up at least 1 ½ hrs. early. All money must be paid the night of the event at the Fairgrounds.
2. All drivers and cars must be entered and at the track 1 hour before the scheduled starting time of derby.
3. Enter early! There will be no limit on the number of cars allowed.
4. You must paint the car number on both side doors. Also, a sign must be placed on the roof of the car with the same number on each side. This is to make it easier for the lap counters to keep up with your laps. You may pick your number provided the number is not already taken.

PARTICIPANT REGULATIONS:

1. All classes will be separated by the engine cylinder. 4 cyl, 6cyl, STOCK 8cyl Cars. MINI Trucks/ Small SUV /MINI Vans will be separated into 2wheel drive and 4wheel drive pending car count. Any truck under ½ ton, regular cab or extended cab (NO four door cabs!) Any small or midsize SUV (No Tahoe, Suburban or Expeditions, etc.). Any model mini vans.
2. All glass including windshield, side windows, rear window, head and taillights must be removed.

3. Hood latch mechanisms must be removed. Winding windows down is not permitted. Front windshield may be left in if you are only running Figure 8. All glass including front windshield must be removed if you are running the Bang-Up part of the Derby.
4. The auto must be swept clean. No junk tires, wheels, metal parts, broken glass, etc. allowed in the car.
5. Chrome molding strips and all seats except the driver's seat must be removed. All carpets is to be removed.
6. On a fresh car, rear end area cannot be mashed down, flattened or crushed.
7. No coil to leaf conversions. All original body mounts must remain in the car. Rear ends may be chained. NO FLAT STACKED LEAF SPRINGS.
8. Welded or chained down engine mounts are recommended.
9. Radiators must remain in their original position or be taken out. Comparable replacement radiators are permitted. Radiators and cooling systems must have antifreeze flushed out and only water can be added. Transmission coolers are permitted but only if they are secured inside the engine compartment OR inside if deemed safe by tech officials.
10. Four-point drivers protection may be used, one bar only between the A-pillars, one bar between the B-pillars, with one connecting side bar on the drivers' and passenger side.
11. All doors must be fastened shut by wire, straps, chains, or welded and reinforced for driver's safety. All cars **MUST** have a minimum of at least driver's door protection; it **MUST** be on the outside the driver's door and must extend 6" on either side of the driver's door. Material must be tapered back to car body at the end of reinforcement area. NO EXCEPTIONS
12. Absolutely NO concrete will be allowed.
13. No seam welding, no welding on frame or body except doors.
14. Only one battery is allowed. If the battery is moved from the original position, it must be placed on floorboard of the front passenger's compartment in a box or crate. It must be securely fastened to floorboard and completely covered.
15. Hood, trunk or tailgate may be wired in six (6) places each, 2 strands of wire per hole. Light chains may be used on trunk or tailgate only. Hood may also be secured by all thread in four locations using no larger than 3/4 all thread. Wiring must be from sheet metal to sheet metal. No other wiring to bumpers or frames. No welds on hood, trunk or tailgate. Officials will make decisions on overuse of wire or chains. Hood & trunk must be left open until after inspection. Hood must remain on cars.
16. It is mandatory that an opening be cut in hood over carburetor, approximately 12" or larger, square or round. Hood latch must be removed. Also, it is recommended that a hole be cut in middle of trunk lid for visibility. Exhaust pipes through hood must extend straight up.
17. Stock gas tanks may be removed from their original position and may be placed inside the car in front of rear axle and no farther forward than the rear of the front seat. A portable tank in the form of a Marine tank or fuel cell is recommended. All tanks must be securely fastened to the floor. Gas hoses and fittings to fuel tanks must be secured and leak proof. Only metal or rubber gas lines are permitted. No plastic lines. All lines going through the floorboard must be covered with a larger rubber line so as not to wear a hole in the lines. A rubber grommet in each hole is OK. This will be checked by officials. Approximately 4 gallons of gas will be permitted per heat. Electric fuel pumps are permitted but must have shut off switch within driver's reach. Inspection officials will give final approval on tanks and fittings. Tanks must be covered.
18. Gas tank can be left in its original position if you are running the Figure 8 race only. The gas tank must be moved per instructions in rule above if you run the Bang-Up part of the Derby.
19. No restrictions on tire size. Double tires or liquids in tires are not permitted. No studs or screws in rims to hold tires. No valve stem protectors. No split rims. Wheel weights must be removed.
20. A strong wire or nylon mesh screen is required on the driver's windows and windshield area. Heavy plexiglass or Lexan is permitted in driver's windshield.
21. Safety belt, Z-90 approved helmet, goggles, safety glasses or face shields are required. A neck brace is recommended. Long pants and long sleeve shirts or jackets are required.
22. Vehicles must always have dependable brakes and boundaries must be observed.

CONTEST RULES:

1. No cars are permitted in the competition area before the heat in which they are to participate.
2. A vehicle will be disqualified if the driver's door comes open during the derby.
3. After the Figure 8 Derby is complete the cars that are capable of running from the heats and the feature will be brought back for a standard bang-up Demolition Derby if all glass has been removed and the gas tank has been moved per previous gas tank rule. During this part of the derby a one-minute limit is enforced by the track officials for re-start and making competitive contact with another car. Hits must be aggressive. Simple contact within the time limit does not constitute combat and could be considered sandbagging. Sandbagging may result in the driver being red flagged.

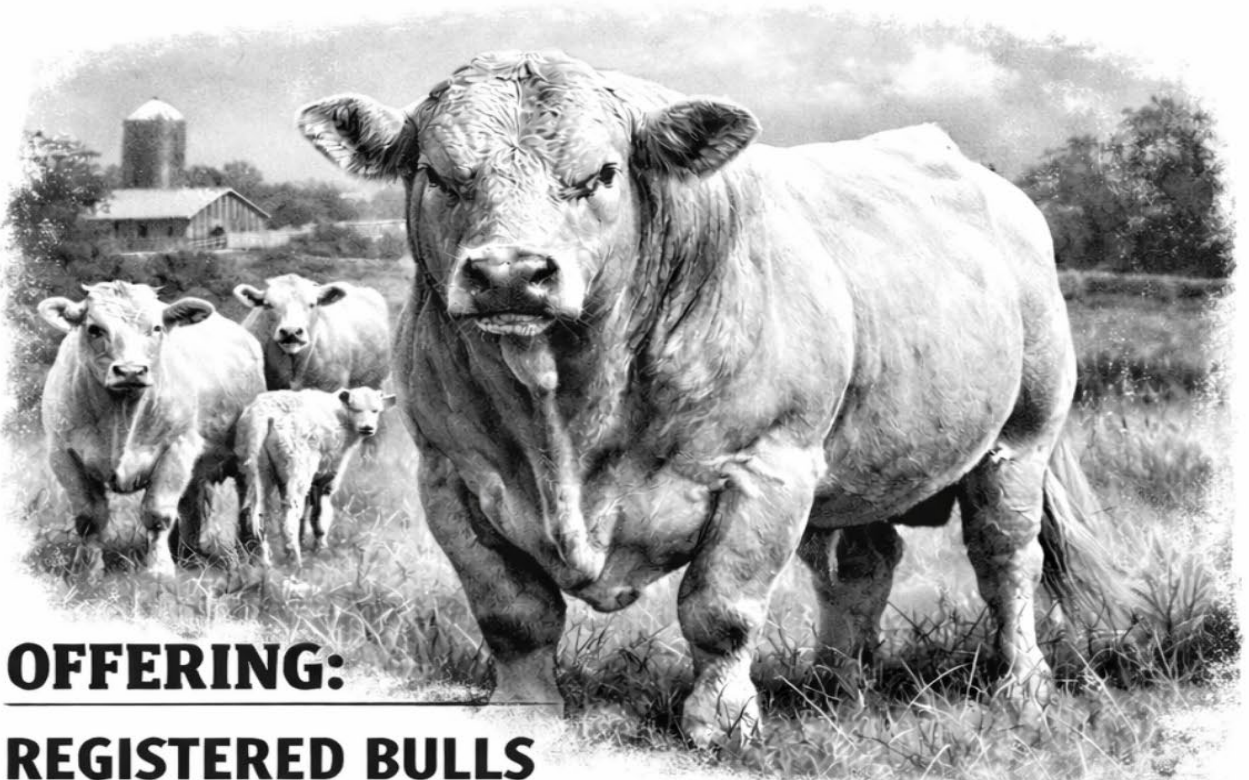
4. A non-refundable \$100.00 protest fee is required to contest another car. All protesting must be done before the driver's meeting.
5. A fire extinguisher is recommended at close reach in the driver's compartment.
6. No one riding on outside of cars or passengers inside the car at any time due to insurance regulations. This will result in automatic disqualification.
7. Boundaries must be observed at all times. Any car shoved or driven out of bounds or is on or over a barrier may be immediately disqualified if Derby officials feel there is a safety hazard.
8. The front end of your car may be reinforced within the following guidelines: All reinforcement must be kept behind the original grill & within the original sheet metal. Bars used must not exceed 2" in diameter. At least 50% of the radiator must be exposed to the front of the car. Bars must not extend back more than 24" towards the driver's compartment. Bumpers may be from any year passenger car, attached to the car by stock hardware, late model bumper shocks, or hardnosed to the unibody. Bumper shocks may be lightly welded, bolted or chained. The Officials will be the judge of excess reinforcement and may require you to add or subtract metal as needed.
9. No deliberate head-on collisions and no deliberate hitting on the driver's door.
10. If it doesn't say you CAN do it. DON'T do it.
11. All cars MUST run a Figure 8 Heat to compete in the Bang-Up.

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS:

1. Driver must be at least 18 years old or have a minor release form signed by parent or guardian.
2. Each vehicle may only be entered into competition 1 time per event. Each driver may enter only 1 time per class. Driver must have a valid state driver's license. (DRIVERS PERMIT PROHIBITED)
3. All contestants must sign a waiver understanding that they are competing at their own risk and that they will not bring suit against any officials, employees, event sponsors or the Jefferson County Fair Association. By signing the release form you agree to all rules set forth.
4. Jefferson Co. Fair officials have the right to approve or reject any or all entry applications.
5. Entry fee will be \$20.00. Vehicles may be divided into 2 separate divisions, (2 Wheel drive or 4 Wheel drive) depending on the amount of vehicles.
6. Entries will close one hour before session is scheduled to start.
7. All vehicles must pass tech inspection before competing. If the officials determine a vehicle is un-safe, officials have the right to not allow vehicle to compete. Vehicle does not need current inspection sticker, license or insurance. Vehicle must be in the same physical condition as at the time it was last inspected for highway use. TECH INSPECTION AREA CLOSSES ONE HOUR BEFORE SESSION IS SCHEDULED TO START.
8. All drivers must attend driver's meeting unless approved by track official.
9. A vehicle may be disqualified for either emotional or physical reasons by Competition Director or track officials. Example: Drugs or drinking alcoholic beverages. Any driver or any of his or her pit crew consuming an intoxicating agent, and/or drugs, prior to or during the event will be disqualified from the event. Drivers will be held responsible for the actions of their crew.
10. If any vehicle and/or driver are disqualified for any reason, no refund of entry fee or pit fee will be given.
11. Competition vehicles must be operated in a safe manner at all times within the confines of the track, pit area, and staging areas. Track officials have the right to stop and disqualify any vehicle being operated in a reckless manner.
12. Pit and staging areas speed limit is 5 M.P.H.
13. Competitor must wait for the Green Flag from Starting Flagman before starting the run. Competitor must stop immediately upon signal from the Red Flag displayed by the Flagman.
14. Only the driver will be allowed in the vehicle when it is being towed or driven in the pit area, staging area, or track. No riders in or on any vehicle while in the pit area, staging area, or in the track area.
15. When Competition vehicle's engine is running, a competent driver must be in the driver's seat. No exceptions. Failure to abide may cause automatic disqualification.
16. Track officials will have the option to check competitors for rule violations at any time during the event.
17. All contestants must drive vehicle onto track and into position to compete under its own power and must leave track under its own power unless for breakage. No one allowed on the track except for track officials and contestant.
18. Driver must wear D.O.T. approved full-face helmet. Helmet strap must be fastened. Driver must wear long pants and long sleeve shirts, no open footwear allowed. Fire retardant jackets and pants, shoes and gloves HIGHLY recommended.
19. 4-wheel drive vehicles must compete in the 4WD class if classes are divided. Vehicle must be in 4-wheel drive when approaching the starting line and must make the entire run through the course in 4-wheel drive.
20. Neck collars will be provided and must be worn.
21. Verbal or physical abuse towards any track official will result in automatic disqualification.
22. Contest will be governed by track officials and Competition Director with all decisions final.

VEHICLE REGULATIONS:

1. Fuel: Pump gas only. All forms of nitro are illegal as a fuel or additive. Nitrous oxide or accelerators are not permitted. No nitrous oxide allowed. Diesel fuel is permitted in diesel engines.
2. Seat belts (both lap belts and shoulder strap) required and must be worn.
3. All vehicles must have a 4-wheel hydraulic brake system in good working condition. No individual wheel brakes allowed.
4. All open body, removable, fiberglass or soft top vehicles must have at least a 6-point roll bar fastened (in no less than 4 locations) directly or indirectly to the frame. Roll bars are recommended in all vehicles in competition. No tailpipe tubing allowed for construction of roll bars.
5. Front and side windows are not required (Hardware Cloth is recommended over drivers' section of front window for protection from flying dirt or rocks).
6. Vehicles must have original firewall and floor in original location. Only holes allowed are those for brakes, clutch, transmission controls and wiring. If battery is relocated, it must be in a plastic battery box securely mounted. No batteries allowed inside of vehicle.
7. Tires must have D.O.T. approved number. Maximum tire height is 36 inches. O.E.M. type wheels are required, maximum wheel width 10". No cutting of tire tread allowed. Wheel weights must be removed before competing. (Non-tagged vehicles only). Hubcap or wheel covers must be removed before competing. No split rims allowed.
8. No loose objects in cab or any place else in vehicle. Any ballast must be securely mounted.

9. Engine must be in original location as intended by manufacturer. NO REAR ENGINE VEHICLES, NO MID ENGINE VEHICLES. Engines must be the same as came in the vehicle and in the original location. Original engine location means just that, engine cannot be moved up, down, forward or backward from the manufactured original location. Motor mounts can be strengthened.
10. Body, hood, bed, fenders and wheelbase must meet O.E.M. specifications. Flat beds must be street legal for 1/W. All pick-up truck beds must be firmly attached to the chassis. Tailgates must be securely fastened or removed. If hood is bolted down, there must be a hole in the hood that measures at least 8" in diameter above the carburetor.
11. No engine modifications to increase horsepower are allowed. "Made for racing" or high-performance engine parts will not be permitted. Stock factory O.E.M. engine components (carburetor, intake manifold, distributor, rocker arms, camshaft, pistons, crankshaft, etc.) are required & must be the correct year, make & model of engine being used. Track officials will have the option to check engines for rule violations at any time during the event.
12. Headers and open exhaust permitted. Exhaust must exit under vehicle.
13. Radiator must be in original location. All engine fans must be shrouded. Radiator overflow hoses must point downward.
14. Must be stock factory suspension, O.E.M. replacement or equivalent. Dual shocks are permitted on front end to reduce breakage. Original front shock must remain mounted in original location: second front shock must be original equipment replacement or equivalent for the vehicle being used. Aftermarket lift kits will be allowed (Max. lift 4"). Length of suspension travel cannot be increased except to accommodate lift kit. Rear shocks must be mounted at original locations. All suspension components must be in good working condition. Racing suspension components will not be allowed.
15. Non-licensed or non-tagged vehicles must have some form of safety strap to hold up front portion of driveshaft in case of failure; must be securely mounted. Chain or cable (min 1/4 "), steel strapping, etc. will be allowed. This is highly recommended on all vehicles.
16. Fuel tanks - Stock fuel tanks in stock locations are highly recommended. Approved fuel tank (racing fuel cell) may be relocated in the bed of pick-up trucks and must be securely mounted. No fuel tanks or fuel lines allowed inside of vehicle unless they are factory installed or they meet the following regulations.
17. If Approved fuel cell is used it must be located in rear most location in vehicle. The fuel cell must be enclosed in a steel containment box manufactured by the fuel cell builder and securely mounted.
18. All fuel lines must be the braided steel type lines with the proper connection fittings and be immediately routed through the floor of the vehicle.
19. Battery cannot be located inside cab of the vehicle.
20. Frames - Must be complete original frame rails and cross members at original locations. Cutting frame rails and cross members to lighten vehicle is not permitted. Frames can be repaired for rust damage: any frame reinforcement must be approved by Tech Official.

CLASSES (Subject to Change):

1. ¼ Ton & Under
2. Semi's
3. ½ ton or larger – 6001 GVW and over

GENERAL RULES:

1. Drivers must stay with their vehicle while their class is participating. Failure to stay with your vehicle can result in a disqualification.
2. Any vehicle that touches the white line on either side of that truck's lane will be disqualified.
3. Winners will return to the staging area immediately to receive staging instruction for their next round.
4. No speeding or hot rodding the pit area. Vehicles operating in an unsafe manner can result in a disqualification/ejection from the event and/or the fairgrounds. No riders at any time.
5. Current and valid photo driver's license is required for the driver. (DRIVERS PERMIT PROHIBITED)
6. Seat belts must be worn, and helmets are required.
7. The use of any form of alcohol/drugs is prohibited.
8. All and any drag racing decisions such as winner and possible disqualifications are FINAL. No appeal process.
9. Exhaust may be other than factory. Bed stacks are allowed, hood stacks allowed passenger side only.
10. Must be cross bolted at outlet of turbo. Minimum of two grade 5 or higher 3/8 bolts. Maximum of 1-inch past turbocharger outlet before any bends.
11. 4-Wheeler or DOT approved helmets are mandatory. All drivers must have their own helmet.

RACING RULES:

1. D.O.T. Tires only (no cut tires).
2. Batteries must be secure, truck bed needs to be clean (no trash, etc.).
3. No rails, tube buggy, or bikes. Must be full body. (no open wheeled vehicles).
4. **After the finish line you must stop before the predetermined stop point line, which will be marked on the track. Failure to do so will result in a disqualification.**
5. Left Lane exits first, followed by right lane. Failure to do so will result in a disqualification.
6. Each class will have a practice round immediately before the competition rounds.
7. GM trucks with independent front suspensions are strongly suggested to have sleeves or upgraded tie rods. Vehicles deemed unsafe will result in disqualification.
8. If the truck is equipped with a snowplow bracket, it's advised to temporarily make the bracket (looking from the side) solid due to it interfering with the sensor pickup. An example would be a thin sheet of metal/cardboard cutout zip tied to side of bracket.



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
